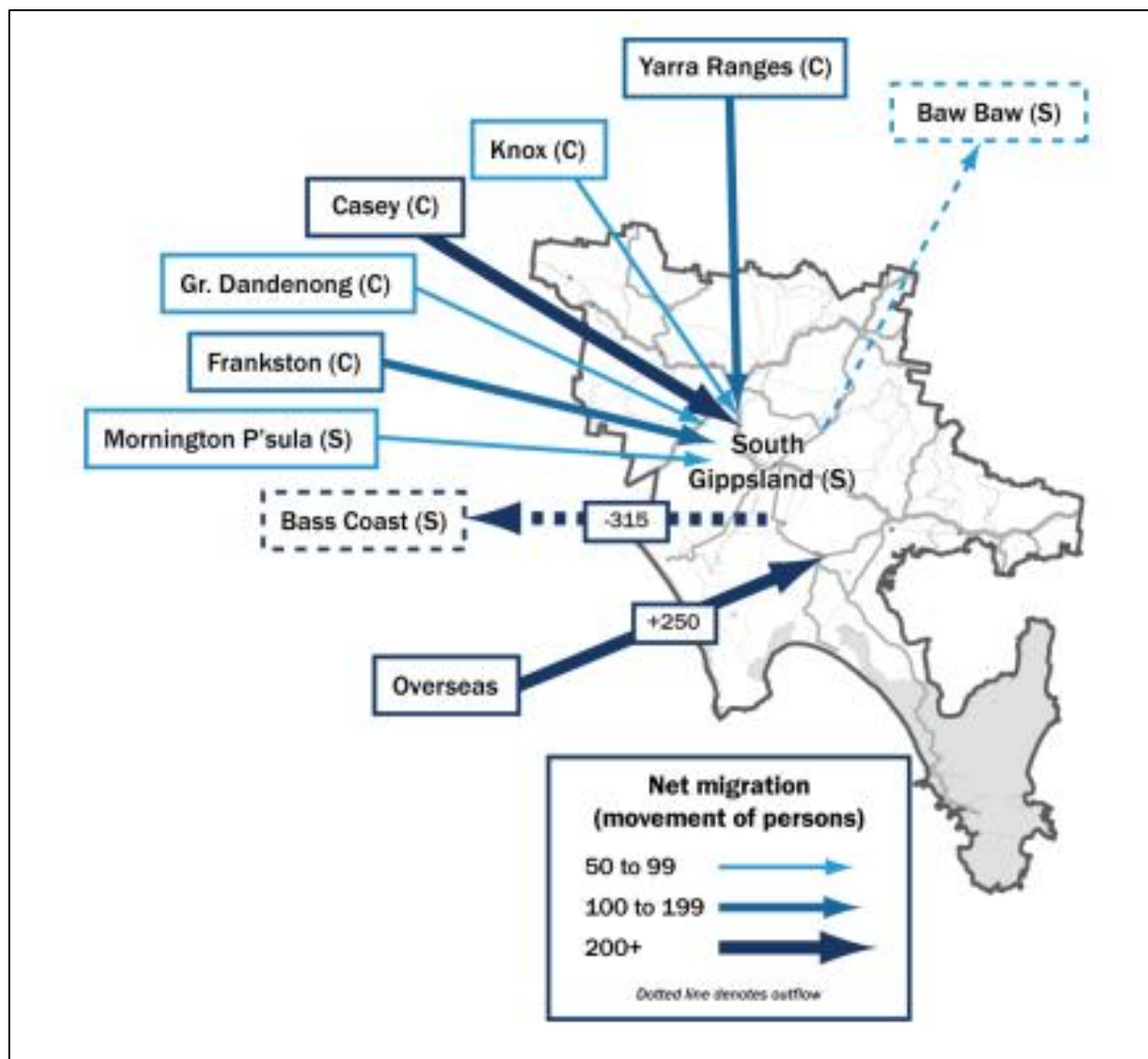


Whole of Shire Migration Flows

In recent years South Gippsland has attracted two main population groups, families and retirees. Generally rural areas attract families and relatively few retirees while more retirees are moving to coastal areas.

Migration flows in and out of South Gippsland 2011 – 2016 analysed by id consulting



Between 2011 and 2016 a total of 4,045 people moved **within** South Gippsland.

In 2016 the age group with the highest net migration into South Gippsland was people aged 55 to 64 years. The highest net gain for this age group was from Frankston (+30) whilst the greatest loss was to Bass Coast (-62)

The largest age group to leave South Gippsland was people aged 18 to 24 years. Most 18 – 24 year olds moved to Bass Coast Shire, Latrobe and Melbourne suburbs. In the same period fewer people of the same age group moved to South Gippsland from Bass Coast, Cardinia, Casey, Frankston and Latrobe.

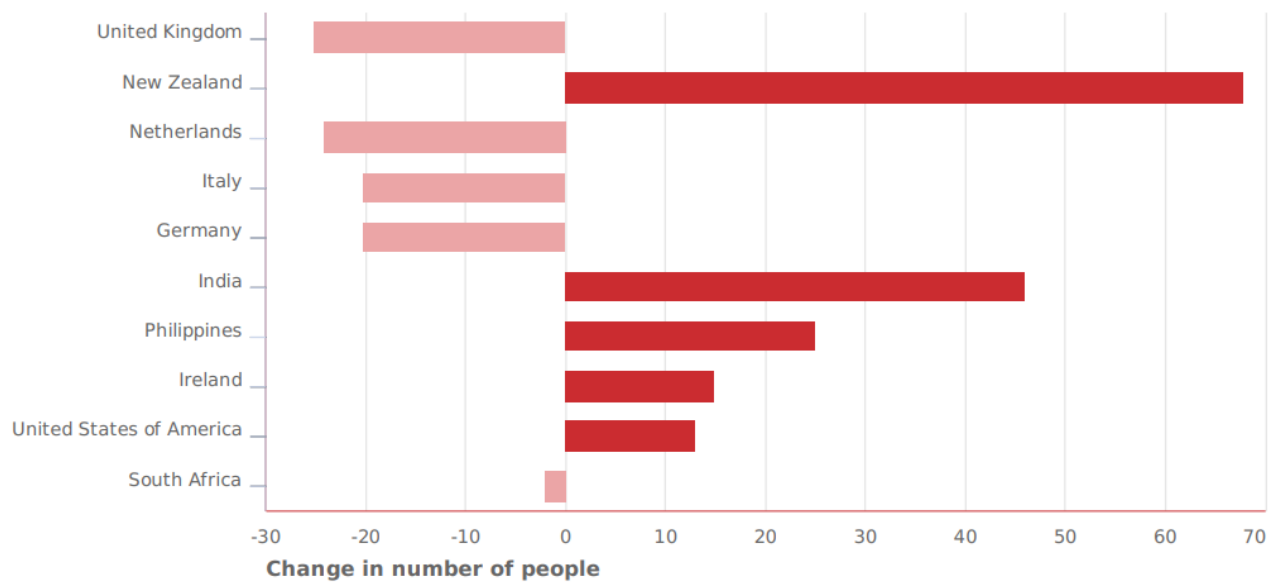
Overseas Arrivals

South Gippsland has a smaller proportion of recent overseas arrivals in comparison with regional Victoria. Of the South Gippsland population born overseas, most arrived before 2001 (78%) and seven percent arrived after 2011.

While the number of people moving from the United Kingdom remains high, the proportion has dropped in the past five years. The proportion of people moving to South Gippsland from New Zealand, India and Philippines in the past five years has increased.
